PEACE LILY

¢ Light

Peace lilies thrive in bright, indirect light, making them perfect for spaces near a window with filtered sunlight. While they can adapt to low light conditions, they may produce fewer blooms or none at all in dimmer settings. Be cautious of direct sunlight, as it can scorch their leaves, causing unsightly brown tips or spots.



We recommend fertilizers like Espoma Organic Indoor! Houseplant Food, Jack's Houseplant Special, or Organic Plant Magic. These options provide essential nutrients to keep your plants vibrant and thriving.



Divide plants during repotting for propagation. Identify sections with healthy roots and at least 2–3 leaves. Use your hands or a sharp, sterilized knife to divide them. Place each division in a pot with fresh soil, water well, and keep in a warm, humid spot until established.



SOIL

For tropical plants we recommend our Rooted Goods All-Purpose Potting Mix, Uncle Mike's Organic Potting Mix, or Espoma's Organic Potting Mix. All three options are great choices for ensuring healthy growth and thriving plants.

L TEMPERATURE

Peace lilies thrive in temperatures ranging from 65°F to 85°F (18°C to 29°C).However, they can struggle if temperatures drop below 50°F (10°C). To keep your peace lily happy, avoid exposing it to cold drafts, air conditioners, open windows during winter, or hot, drying air from vents.



Peace lilies are not pet-safe. They contain calcium oxalate crystals, which can cause irritation if ingested by cats, dogs, or other pets. If you have curious pets, it's best to keep peace lilies out of reach or opt for pet-friendly plants.

REGION OF ORIGIN

Water your peace lily when the top 1-2 inches of soil feel dry to the touch. Provide enough water to evenly moisten the soil, ensuring any excess drains out completely—standing water can lead to root rot. If the leaves start to droop, it's a clear sign your plant is thirsty. A thorough watering should perk it up within a few hours!



Peace lillies may be susceptible to pests such as spider mites, mealybugs, and aphids. Regularly inspect your plant for signs of infestation and treat promptly with natural or chemical remedies.
