

TRANSPLANTING ESTABLISHED ROSES

Best Time to Move:

Roses can be moved any time of year, but early spring is ideal—
 or fall when the soil is workable and the plant is still dormant.

Before Digging Up the Rose:

- Prepare the new planting location in advance.
- The most important goal is to keep the root system as intact as possible.
- Use a shovel to cut a circle around the base of the bush, about
 12"-18" out.

To Prevent Transplant Shock (Important!):

- Balance the length of the canes with the length of the roots.
- This reduces stress on the plant and supports healthy leaf hydration as it establishes.

Planting Guidelines:

- Plant deeply with Bio-tone Starter Fertilizer and compost.
- Water thoroughly after planting.
- Check moisture levels daily—do not let the plant dry out.
- Begin feeding after 2−3 weeks.
